## Summer Food Service Program

### Summer 2020 In Greene County:

103,453 meals and snacks distributed at 11 sites

**The State Food Purchase Program (SFPP)** is a state-funded program administered by the PA Department of Agriculture. Income Eligibility is below 150 percent of the poverty level.

**The Pennsylvania Agricultural Surplus System (PASS)** is a state-funded program administered by the PA Department of Agriculture. It provides funds to cover the costs associated with harvesting, processing, packaging and transporting surplus products in order to donate those items to the charitable food system.

**The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)** is a federally-funded program administered by the PA Department of Agriculture. Income eligibility is below 150 percent of the poverty level.

**Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)** is a federally-funded entitlement program administered by the PA Department of Human Services. Income eligibility is below 160 percent of the poverty level or below 200 percent for households with an individual over age 60 or with a disability.

**The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)** is a federally-funded program administered by the PA Department of Agriculture. Seniors with an income that is 130 percent of the poverty level are eligible.

**The National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs** are federally-funded entitlement programs administered by the PA Department of Education. Income eligibility is below 130 percent of the poverty level for free meals and below 185 percent for reduced-price meals.

**The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)** is a federally-funded entitlement program administered by the PA Department of Education.

**The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)** is a federally-funded entitlement program administered by the PA Department of Education.
